CALENDAR FOR THIS WEEK

26th Oct - SS Chad and Cedd: Chad, who died at Lichfield on 2nd March 672, and Cedd, who died at Lastingham (Yorkshire) on this day in 664, were brothers who were educated at Lindisfarne under Aidan. Cedd was founder of many monasteries and was sent as a bishop to evangelise the East Saxons and established his See at Bradwell (Essex). He died of the plague at his monastery in Lastingham. Chad was Abbot of Lastingham when chosen Bishop of Northumbria, but his ordination was contested by Wilfrid, and he humbly withdrew. He was then sent as Bishop of Mercia, where he founded the See Despite the shortness of his of Lichfield. ministry, he was immediately revered as a

saint because of the holiness of his life, his outstanding humility, and his dedication to preaching the Gospel.

28th Oct – St Simon and Jude: the name of Simon is placed eleventh in the list of apostles and nothing is known of him, except that he was born at Cana and was known as the Zealot. Jude, also known as Thaddaeus, was the apostle who, at the Last Supper, asked the Lord why he showed himself only to his disciples and not to the whole world (John 14.22).

St Jude is depicted in one of the stained glass windows in Our Lady's Church, donated by the late Ted and Rita Hanley to celebrate their Golden Wedding Anniversary.

THOUGHTS FOR THIS WEEKEND

Thoughts for the 30th Sunday of the Year.

This week's thoughts are from Nicholas Hutchinson's book, Praying Each Day of The Year, Volume 3.

Nicholas was an outstanding teacher and mentor of young people. He taught in several De La Salle High Schools but also served the Lord for many years while incapacitated by ill health, residing as a member of the De La Salle, St John's Community in St Helens where I met him. He always asked about others and showed tremendous interest in the events in our parish. He wrote many books to assist teachers in their Christian vocation and also composed the beautiful Prayer of Commendation that I use at the end of Funeral Masses. His dates are 1954 to 2016.

Margaret Clitheroe was a butcher's wife in York during the sad and tragic times of the sixteenth century when people were persecuted, some for being Catholic and some for being Protestant. In Margaret's time an Act of Parliament made it High Treason to be a Catholic or encourage others to be Catholic. Margaret herself was a convert to the Catholic faith and kept a Catholic teacher for her own children and those of a few neighbours. She had a priest's hiding place in her house in York ready to conceal a visiting Catholic priest if her house was about to be searched. When it was, candles and vestments used for Mass were discovered. Margaret was taken to court and charged with treason; standing before the judge she

refused to plead guilty or not guilty to the charge of treason. By not pleading she wanted to spare her children and servants and neighbours from having to give evidence. At the same time she did not want to trouble the consciences of the members of the jury. The crime of sheltering, or helping, a Catholic punishable by hanging priest was Margaret knew that she faced a worse penalty if she did not plead in court. She was to be lain on the floor and have weights placed on a door that would lie on top of her. A sharp stone was placed under her back and indeed on the 25th March 1586 Mrs Margaret Clitheroe was crushed to death in York, having prayed for Queen Elizabeth.

She was one of the forty martyrs of England and Wales to be canonised on 25th October 1970.

In that century, the 1500s, there were also Protestant martyrs. Thirty one years before Margaret's death two Protestant Bishops were burned at the stake in Oxford while the Catholic Mary was Queen. Bishop Hugh Latimer spoke to Bishop Nicholas Ridley as the flames were about to be lit, "Be of good comfort Master Ridley and play the man. We shall this day light such a candle by God's grace in England as I trust will never be put out."

Margaret's house can be visited at 36 The Shambles in York, where Mass is often celebrated. Recently, as part of the celebrations and welcome of the city to the new Anglican Archbishop of York, the local

Catholic Bishop of Middlesbrough and the new Archbishop prayed in Margaret's house.

Pope John Paul II, when celebrating a gathering at the racecourse in York on 31st May 1982, where married people renewed their marriage vows, said, "I deeply appreciate the presence here of many fellow Christians. I rejoice that we are united in a common Baptism and in our renewed search for Christian Unity."
